This was especially true with the children. Once their minds were off their work, it was hard for them to concentrate themselves upon it again for some time. 4. Mind-wandering --thinking of outside things--caused decrease in rapidity of action. 5. If subjects were in a hurry, for any reason, the work was slower than usual. 6.
